**Club Purpose**

RPI Global Medical Brigades is a chapter of the worldwide organization Global Brigades, Inc., the largest student-led global health and sustainable development organization. The Medical Brigades portion works to provide comprehensive health service in rural communities with limited access to healthcare. The program is driven by motivated student volunteers, such as those of the RPI chapter, who volunteer with licensed medical professionals and community health workers. We set up a mobile medical clinic in a community for one week. During this time, RPI GMB provides medical attention, consultation, education, and pharmaceuticals, completely free of charge, to individuals in dire need. This medical brigade is part of a holistic approach to improve quality of life and is an irreplaceable experience to our volunteers who leave more humble, more aware of the world, and more motivated than ever to pursue community service opportunities and make a difference in the world. Over the spring 2017 brigade, we will be working on a Public Health-focused project as part of a brigade in the same community we set up our mobile work station. Our club's purpose is to raise the funds necessary to help subsidize individual costs and travel expenses. Previously, cost of the brigade has deterred members from going on our annual trip which is what our club's main functioning is dedicated to. Our club is open to all RPI students who then have the opportunity to shadow licensed doctors in medical consultations, assist in a pharmacy under the direction of licensed pharmacists, perform triage with the help of skilled paramedics, and facilitate educational workshops. This opportunity equips RPI student volunteers with once-in-a-lifetime experiences that will truly change the way they view the world and equip them with both personal and professional skills that will enable students to make a true difference aboard and at home. As a club we had the opportunity to travel to Honduras during the 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 cycles and to Panama during the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 cycles as well as Nicaragua in 2015-2016. In the case of the latter we treated 580 individuals from the community of El Zapallal during our weeklong stay, with the number of patients jumping to near 1000 the following year as we set up work service in the community in Nicaragua. Additionally, in an effort to generate a greater difference at home we have partnered with the Whitey M. Young clinic located in South Troy (6 102nd Street) to establish a long term shadowing and volunteering project. This will give interested students a chance to work with patients on a more local level, and become trained in the same disciplines they would be expected to help out in when working in the clinics abroad. There is need in Troy for an affordable healthcare and health education system, and our partnership with this organization will give us the means to provide aid in the effort, all while preparing ourselves to represent both the US and RPI abroad as knowledgeable and responsible students. At the time of submission of this

application, we will be two weeks away from our first round of volunteer work. In summary, when it comes to healthcare and medical education, we strive to live up to the motto of this institution: why not change the world?

# RED ARMY

Dear Rensselaer Union Executive Board Members,

Red Army has been a continuous supporter of Student Athletics from tailgating for various athletic teams such as Football, Men's Hockey, etc. to promoting the sale of Season Hockey Tickets in the Houston Field House through Hockey Line. Red Army has seen many variations in its leadership and organization throughout the years but the Red Army of today has held fast in its pursuit of generating team spirit within our student body.

This semester, Red Army sold 141 season tickets during Hockey Line which increases our numbers to over 250 members which makes us one of the largest Union Recognized Club on campus. Every year we host tailgating events to increase team spirit and attendance at on-campus games. In the past we primarily focused on Men's Hockey but as the years have progressed, we have increased support for other athletic teams. We have aggressively promoted Red Army through various advertising efforts. We have very popular Twitter and Facebook pages to bolster team spirit through the use of social media and to inform our members/followers of upcoming events. We have also revamped our website in an effort to further advertise our organization on campus to the student body.

This year our rally towel budget has been reduced from 400 towels to 250 towels. Red Army has always managed to distribute all of our rally towels and last year specifically we ran out of towels before the buses of students even arrived. The Mayor's cup is an extremely popular game, last year over 8,400 fans showed up to cheer for (or against) our Engineers. That's nearly twice the capacity of the Field House. Due to the significant increase in participation in the past years and the date of the Mayor's cup being during the spring semester rather than during winter break, we are requesting that the number of rally towels we have budgeted be increased to ensure that as many RPI hockey fans as possible can have a chance to get their own souvenir rally towel.

The Funding that we are requesting is dependent on two factors: the number towels that we are purchasing and the number of colors used in the design. The next pages contain tables explaining the price breakdown per color per towel, the total cost depending on the number of towels and number of colors, and the total subsidy being requested based on the total number of towels and number of colors approved.






